Purpose of Numbering and Labeling

Standard Numbering System

- o Panel Identification: Each distribution board or switchboard is assigned a unique Electrical Identification Number, which is used as a prefix for all circuits fed from that panel .
- o Circuit Numbering: Circuits are numbered sequentially within the panel. For example, if a panel is labeled P1, its circuits may be numbered P1-01, P1-02, etc., for easy reference .
- o Wire Numbering: Wires are labeled according to the circuit they belong to, often using the panel number and circuit number. This ensures that each wire can be traced back to its source and load .

Wiring Connections in a Single-Phase Distribution Box

- o Main MCB: A double-pole MCB acts as the main switch, receiving the incoming phase and neutral supply .
- o RCCB: Connected downstream of the main MCB, the RCCB provides protection against leakage currents and electrical shocks. Its rating should match the main MCB .
- o Branch MCBs: Single-pole MCBs are used for individual circuits, such as lighting, sockets, or appliances. Each MCB output is connected to the respective load, with the neutral wire connected to a neutral bus bar .
- o Earthing: All protective earth connections are linked to the earth bus bar to ensure safety .

Labeling Best Practices

- o Use durable labels (vinyl or polyester) for circuit identification .
- o Clearly indicate the area or appliance each breaker controls, e.g., "Kitchen Lights" or "AC Unit" .
- o Update labels whenever circuits are added or modified to maintain accuracy .
- o Avoid temporary solutions like masking tape, which can fade or peel .
