

Drilling holes to the electrical wiring in the distribution box

- o Support the box firmly to minimize vibration. After drilling, remove burrs with a file to prevent wire insulation damage .

Drilling in Plastic Boxes

- o For small holes, a hand drill works well. For larger or square openings, start with a pilot hole and use a jigsaw .
- o Alternative methods include heating an awl or iron rod to punch holes, but this requires caution to avoid burns or cracking the plastic .
- o Drill from the reverse side if possible to achieve cleaner edges .

Compliance and Finishing

- o Ensure holes do not compromise the box's structural integrity. For UL-listed enclosures, holes should not exceed 25% of each sidewall area .
- o After drilling, smooth edges and install cable clamps or grommets to protect wires from abrasion.

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o Recheck that the box is securely mounted and level before reconnecting power .
